Today at Hillwood you will play a variety of games that will get you moving and having fun. Work with friends and create a bond brought on by friendly competition and team organization.

To earn your Field Day badge:

- Complete all the "Try This!" activities in this booklet.
- Keep track of the activities you complete by marking the checkbox on each page.
- Show your troop leader your completed packet and she can purchase the Field Day badge from the Girl Scout Council of the Nation's Capital's shop.



Step #1 — Team up and dress up

Theme costumes.

Show your team spirit with matching uniforms! Creating unity between teammates helps promote healthy competition and good sportsmanship on and off the field. Uniforms come in all shapes and styles, from a game day jersey to a jeweled crown or a luxurious cape.

<u>Visit the Entry Hall</u> in Hillwood's mansion to find the large <u>portrait of Catherine the</u>
<u>Great</u>, empress of Russia from 1762-96, to see what kind of clothing makes up a royal uniform. Like many kings and queens, Catherine has a crown, a cape and a special sash to show her position as ruler.

Try This!

Visit the **ART PROJECT** near Hillwood's **LUNAR LAWN** to create a portrait of you, or one of your team members, wearing a uniform designed for your field day competition.

Let your imagination run wild as you design your field day uniform! Think about how you want your uniform to represent your team. Will it include symbols that express your team's traits, such as strength, speed, or endurance? Will it include features that highlight favorite things, such as a favorite superhero, favorite food, or favorite color?

Discuss how your uniform helps you identify with your team. How does it create positive team spirit? What does it communicate to others?

Step #2— Play a historical game

Make your event a blast from the past.

Marjorie Merriweather Post loved French arts and culture of the 1700s. She collected decorative arts from that time, such as furniture, tapestries and elegant boxes. You can see examples of these objects in the **French drawing room** in Hillwood's mansion.

Visit the **GARDEN GAMES** on the **LUNAR LAWN** to play the Game of Graces.

The Game of Graces is thought to have originated in France and was popular in the 1800s. It was thought to promote graceful movement for girls.

How to Play:

- Each player holds two sticks. Stand 10 to 15 feet apart.
- One player holds the sticks crossed in the middle with the hoop hanging near the cross. Pull the two sticks quickly apart, causing the hoop to fly up and over to the other play.
- The other player catches the hoop on her sticks and returns the hoop in the same way.



• You can keep score by counting who catches the hoop the most times.

Step #3 — Play a scientific game

Exercise your brain.

Keep your body and your brain active as you enjoy your field day at Hillwood. Walk the garden paths, as Marjorie Post used to do for exercise, as you explore the gardens to discover the plants. Notice that the plants come in all shapes, sizes, colors, and textures. These are adaptations that help plants thrive in different environments. An adaptation is a feature that helps a living organism survive and function in its environment.

This card table has a hinged top that unfolds to display a playing surface with a needlework cover that depicts flowers, leaves, and playing cards.
